A MESSAGE FROM AIMEE FIFAREK, LIBRARY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

If 2019 had a theme, it would be "Communication and Change." We saw a lot of it in this busy year, with major work being done on library funding, building construction, and major changes to our community.



Regular visitors to our libraries saw many new faces this year, with 25 new staff members, including Youth Services and Programming Director Erin Phemester. Our Library Board welcomed two new Trustees: JoAnn Stock of Youngstown and Jamie Viano of North Lima. It was also the year we said goodbye to 16 staff, including long-time employee and Canfield Supervisor Linda Kucalaba and Trustee John Yerian of Poland.

Our community experienced a major transition when *The Vindicator* ceased operations after 150 years as our local newspaper. PLYMC hosted a Who's Who in local media session to introduce the community to new and expanded media services that appeared in the wake of that announcement, including the new *Vindicator* edition of the *Tribune Chronicle*, an expanded *Business Journal*, and the digital newspaper *Mahoning Matters*.

PLYMC was happy for the influx of news sources and gave them plenty to report on in 2019, including the Library Board giving the green light to the Main Library renovation project, the start of construction of the Cultural, Literacy, Workforce, and Community Center (CLWCC) which will house our new Campbell Library, and a successful levy campaign that will give us 5 years of reliable funding.

But with all of that going on, we didn't forget to take time out to read. Over 5,000 people participated in 2019's Summer Discovery program, and 600 of them celebrated their accomplishments by seeing Laura Numeroff of "If You Give a Mouse a Cookie" fame speak at Stambaugh Auditorium. Some 100 people attended the annual Literary Society Event to hear from author Andrew Gross. And 795 people participated in events for The NEA Big Read, culminating in a visit and reading from Luis Albert Urrea.

But the most important thing that happened to PLYMC in 2019 is you – all the people who came to programs, talked with our staff, checked out materials, and invited me to speak about the ways the Library works with partners and the community every day. Thank you for your ongoing support, encouragement, and input throughout 2019!

Voters overwhelmingly approved a renewal levy in

November 2019, helping to protect our community's

libraries and keep them strong. Through careful strategic

planning and good fiscal stewardship, our system

operates debt free. The levy is critical because it

sustain locations, services and programs offered

throughout Mahoning County. The Library's levy is

key to success, now and in the future.

The Library's Board of Trustees has always been

what the community wants and needs from its library system. And 2019 was no exception. Community input on the renovation of our Main Library, which was gathered in 2018, became the basis for the project as it began to take shape in 2019. In April, the Board hired architects: Bostwick Design Partnership, working with RBF CoLab and Paul Hagman, and CT Consultants. In October, trustees brought on AMHigley Company as Construction Manager at Risk, with Dawn Incorporated. Our Library Executive Director Aimee Fifarek has dedicated herself to this project, working with the architect and a team of Library staff members. On behalf of the Library Board of Trustees, I can say with certainty that we share the community's enthusiasm for this important project. The Board is also appreciative of the strong passage of the Library's Levy in 2019. We thank you for your support.

At the Library, our goal is moving forward. Whether through traditional means, like quality collection and reference services, or with new initiatives like support for social service and mental health issues.


Regardless of what form it takes, the goal remains the same: to connect our community with reliable information that fosters learning and enrichment.

The Library was fortunate to receive a number of literacy grants in 2019 which supported not only early learning but community-wide reading initiatives:

In 2019, a year of great progress, we moved forward with the renovation of the Main Library, which opened in 1910. The renovation's tagline says it all, "Bright History, Vibrant Future," capturing the strong foundation of this Carnegie library's history, as well as the innovations and technology which will become a part of the newly renovated Main Library.
